A vort on Chanukah

- compiled by Simcha Lichtenstein and typed up by Evan Dweck, thank you! Rav Dessler TZ'L writes in Michtav M' Eliyahu that there are two ways a yid approaches a Chag. Most people begin with great Simcha as he gets used to the Chaq. This is because their Simcha is external. However, Gedolei Torah are different. Their Simcha is internal from contemplating a lot on the meaning of the Chag and their Simcha increases every day. There are different levels in Avodas HaBorei. There is avoda which is external, Lo Lishma or doing by rote which Rav Dessler calls avodas hanefesh even if there is excitement in one's avoda this is external avoda which diminishes every day. However, there are those whose avoda is internal which he calls avodas Haneshama. Their Simcha is their avoda increases every day. This is relevant to the Parei Hachag, the cows offered as Korbanos for the gentiles that are decreased by one every day. This is external avoda. This was the argument between Bais Shamai and Bais Hillel in the Gemorah Shabbos page 21A. Bais Shamai held that on the first night a person lights all eight lights and every day one lights one less and Bais Hillel held on the first night a person lights one light and adds one every night. Bais Hillel held that the Chachamim established the mitzvah of lighting the menorah in the remembrance of the Chanukah miracle according to the avoda of the individual, who serve the Tzaddikim Gedolei, who internally, which is according to the days that have gone by. Each day is a greater recognition of the miracle from their contemplating the miracle that HaKodesh Baruch Hu did for us. And Bais Shamai held that the mitzvah was established according to the Klal, the masses who serve externally and each day the Simcha of the Chag is diminished. We light according to Bais Hillel in



order to remind ourselves that we should strive to be like the Tzaddikim to increase our awareness and Simcha of the Chag which requires us to serve HaBorei Olam internally.
